

Evaluate the Proposal:

Evaluate the proposal based on the following 5 questions by determining whether each meets expectations or needs improvement:

Importance of Purpose: This criterion evaluates the significance and relevance of the proposed Working Group's objectives. Reviewers assess whether the purpose is crucial to the organization's goals and mission.

Feasibility: Reviewers consider the practicality and likelihood of the Working Group achieving its stated goals. This assessment examines whether the proposal is realistic and attainable.

Value of Deliverables: This criterion examines the quality and impact of the outcomes the Working Group aims to produce. Reviewers evaluate whether the proposed deliverables hold substantial value for the organization.

Expertise: Reviewers assess the competence and qualifications of the individuals involved in the proposed Working Group. The focus is on determining whether the team possesses the necessary expertise and/or recruitment strategy to successfully execute the plan.

Alignment with Steering Committee Areas of Interest: This criterion gauges how closely the proposal aligns with the specific interests and priorities of the Steering Committee. Reviewers evaluate if the Working Group's objectives match the committee's focus areas.

- •Career development for clinical and translational research staff (broadly defined)
- •Team science mentoring dissemination and implementation
- •Identification of health determinants (biology, structural, and social)

3=Good- A "Good" rating suggests that the proposal meets the basic standards and expectations of a Working Group. While it may lack the exceptional qualities of higher ratings, it still demonstrates value and feasibility.

4=Fair- A "Fair" rating implies that the proposal has notable weaknesses or lacks certain critical elements. It may require improvements or adjustments to fully align with the goals of a Working Group.


5=Poor- A "Poor" rating indicates that the Working Group Proposal does not meet the standards of a Working Group. It may lack essential details, expertise, or alignment with the CTSA's objectives. It requires substantial revisions for reconsideration.

2025 Spring Meeting Planning

Demonstrate ROI for community engagement initiatives

- Conduct workshop at the Spring Meeting with detailed report out to capture the output.
- Continue with quarterly workshops to build capacity and relevant speakers and discussions at full team meetings.
- Partner with other ECs such as Integration Across the Lifespan and Workforce Development around this topic.
- Publish white paper that outlines actionable ways to build sustainable, continuous funding for community engagement efforts that are independent of specific research proposals and demonstrates measures of ROI for long-term partnerships between research institutions and community partners.
- Publication of a toolkit to promote effective collaborations between institutions and community partners.
- Sponsoring working groups and collaborating with other groups.











2025 EC Goal

OVERARCHING GOAL:

Catalog and visualize types of community partnerships across the CTSA network to facilitate collaboration.

ACTIVITIES:

- Create a taxonomy of partnership types (e.g., with state health and human services agencies, state public health departments, Area Health Education Centers, Cooperative Extension Systems, local public health departments, local community organizations, ...) that is informed by prior research and with input from EC members and others.
- Survey hubs on partner engagement (by type) and solicit impact stories that are categorized using this taxonomy.
- Create visualizations of these data so that they are accessible across the network.

INITIAL IDEAS ON LONGER TERM BENEFITS:

- Inform collaboration documentation for CTSA UM1 applications.
- Update regularly if found to be useful for collaboration.
- Link with Retrospective Case Studies workgroup or others to identify impact stories from different types of partnerships (mixed methods approach).






