

Importance of Purpose: This criterion evaluates the significance and relevance of the proposed Working Group's objectives. Reviewers assess whether the purpose is crucial to the organization's goals and mission.

Feasibility: Reviewers consider the practicality and likelihood of the Working Group achieving its stated goals. This assessment examines whether the proposal is realistic and attainable.

Value of Deliverables: This criterion examines the quality and impact of the outcomes the Working Group aims to produce. Reviewers evaluate whether the proposed deliverables hold substantial value for the organization.

Expertise: Reviewers assess the competence and qualifications of the individuals involved in the proposed Working Group. The focus is on determining whether the team possesses the necessary expertise and/or recruitment strategy to successfully execute the plan.

Alignment with Steering Committee Areas of Interest: This criterion gauges how closely the proposal aligns with the specific interests and priorities of the Steering Committee. Reviewers evaluate if the Working Group's objectives match the committee's focus areas.





5=Poor- A "Poor" rating indicates that the Working Group Proposal does not meet the standards of a Working Group. It may lack essential details, expertise, or alignment with the CTSA's objectives. It requires substantial revisions for reconsideration.

Objectives

- Provide an update on the overall membership status (decline) for the DEIA EC.
- 2. Share what has been done by the EC to help support the hubs (particularly those facing challenges in conducting their work) given the current climate.
- 3. Ask the Steering Committee next steps in collectively successfully supporting DEIA in translational research given the current, and projected climate.









Membership and Participation

- 88 members on the distribution list (not including 5 CCOS Support Staff)
- 57 hubs on the distribution list (not including CCOS and NCATS)
- 78 registered meeting participants from 51 hubs

- 3 who stated they had to leave the EC due to university/state DEIA mandates
- Some have not contacted us but are not present, which may be related to the current climate

Randy Urban shared updates from recent Steering Committee meetings (6/24 and 7/8).

- Houston hub discussed Translational Science in Training Programs (TL1/T32 Co-Director, Dr. Joya Chandra)
 - Presented findings from the National T Directors group related to the importance of offering training in TS.
 - Houston program has lab-based mentor and a clinical mentor, trainees are required go to clinics and see some of the roadblocks in doing clinical research
 - Dr. Wayne McCormick and Dr. Amanda Vogel's efforts to provide training and resources in translational science were shared.
- Updates from each hub.

August 15 Pod Summary:

Meeting Topics included

- Updates from 7/22 SC meeting and the Fall Meeting session on successful RC2s, Element Es, and R03s
- TL1 Award Challenges
 - Late notice creates challenges for getting stipends to TL1 trainees.
 - There is increasing scrutiny on reporting from the HHS and OMB level, which slows down NIH GM. E.g., greater scrutiny on Other Support. In May 2025, training will become available.
- Discussion with Dr. Kurilla
 - Topics included: RPPR Burden with new funding suite, challenge of flat budget over 7 years, Financial challenges for partnering with MSIs, How can CTSAs tackle pending big issues?, and Phase III clinical trials.

 working groups, (b) apply to be part of the advisory team and (c) when will RFAs become available so hubs can
