






2025 Alignment with Agency Priorities

Element E and Pilot Projects:

- Costs associated with any individual Element E and Pilot Projects that did not align with Agency Priorities were removed for the current budget year
- In general, these costs were not removed in the outyears
- Reminder: it is critical that all future Element E and pilots are aligned with agency priorities
- Reminder: that any project with HSR or VAS will require prior approval
 - Projects with HSR or VAS can follow the instructions on our webpage:
 - Prior Approval Requests for Human Subjects Research | National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences
 - Prior Approval Requests for Vertebrate Animal Research | National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences



2025 Alignment with Agency Priorities

- Removal of Costs for a Role/Position/Activity (NOT removal of people):
 - Costs associated with any role/position/activity that did not align with Agency Priorities were removed
 and the costs for these activities will not be reinstated for the remainder of the grant.
 - The terms of award were specific to the activity and not the individual.
 - Recipients maintain rebudgeting authority in accordance with the NIH Grants Policy Statement for any
 expertise that may have been required for the project.
 - If this rebudgeting requires a prior approval (named KP on the grant) then please ensure the request and justification are submitted timely and in accordance with NIH Grants Policy.
- Example: EAC and IAC members removed (if no grant funds are used to support their participation):
 - Consistent with actions being taken to implement HHS priorities at the agency and NIH level, individuals
 whose appointments are based primarily on expertise inconsistent with agency priorities must be
 removed. All <u>activity</u> and <u>costs</u> inconsistent with agency priorities must be removed from NIH grants.



NIH Notices

- New Application Structure for NIH-Funded International Collaborations (NOT-OD-25-155) (Released September 12, 2025)
- Policy:
 - For grants requesting NIH funding for one or more foreign components, NIH will require that competing
 applications submit applications to a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) that supports the new
 PF5 <u>Activity Code</u> for grants, new UF5 Activity Code for cooperative agreements, or another complex
 mechanism activity code that supports the International Project component type.

NIH Notices

- Update: No-Cost Extension Functionality in eRA (<u>NOT-OD-25-142</u>) (Released August 7, 2025)
 - NIH has re-enabled the <u>No-Cost Extension functionality</u> within eRA Commons
 - Recipients may resume initiating first no-cost extensions in eRA Commons, in accordance with the NIH Grants Policy Statement, <u>Section 8.1.1.3</u>
 - Requests that were previously submitted via the prior approval module will not be reviewed, and recipients will need to initiate the first no cost extension within the Status module by using the Extension action



Reminder: Hyperlinks in Applications are not Allowed

- A new Administrative Flag is being communicated on Summary Statements:
 - UNALLOWED HYPERTEXT ADMINISTRATIVE NOTE: During the review of this application, unallowed hypertext was noted in the application as only doi (digital object identifier) and .gov sites are allowed. Hypertext, hyperlinks, and URLs are only allowed when specifically noted in funding opportunities or application instructions. NIH is tracking this warning and has the authority to withdraw future noncompliant applications (NOT-OD-20-174).
- There is no change in the NIH policy on the use of hyperlinks. This is an enforcement action.
- Reminder: Hyperlinks and URLs **are only allowed** when specifically noted in funding opportunity announcement and form field instructions. The use of hyperlinks is typically limited to citing relevant publications in biosketches and publication lists.
- NOTE: CTSA NOFOs do not allow hyperlinks / URLs outside of what is allowable.





Reminder: Compliance

- Grant recipients are held accountable for compliance to NIH Policy, including RPPR submissions, FFRs, drawdowns, appointment/termination forms, and Clinical Trial Reporting
- Be prepared for potential compliance reviews and actions

Reminder: HS/VAS/Clinical Trial Coding of Applications

- Reminder to read the instructions for <u>how</u> to submit your application to ensure that future pilot, Element E
 Projects, and scholar projects will be able to conduct research with:
 - Vertebrate Animals
 - Human Subjects (Applications HAVE to answer "Yes" to the involvement of Human Subjects or will be considered non-responsive and will not be reviewed)
 - Clinical Trials (See <u>UM1 FAQs</u> under "Other Questions" last question)
 - It should be anticipated that research projects involving clinical trials might be initiated during the seven-year grant period. If there is any potential for research projects involving clinical trials to be initiated during the seven-year grant period, then appropriate information must be provided.
- Note that if your application is considered misclassified in terms of CTs it will be withdrawn prior to review!
 (If you have submitted a CT and do not have ALL the information required for review) Questions?
 CONTACT YOUR PO
- Reminder to read the Notice of Grant Award to ensure you know what is allowed and not allowed for VAS, HSR and CTs
 - If the grant is restricted for HS or VAS activity then no research can move forward until the NoA is revised to reflect allowability
 - **There will be accountability for FY26



Alert: CTSA Program – Spring Meetings

- Due to government-wide contract cuts, the CCOS contract was reduced by 7% for the remainder of FY25 (June through October 1) and 17% for the outyears
- Providing the Spring CTSA Group Meetings with the Fall Annual CTSA Program Meeting identified cost savings
- As such, the CTSA Group Meetings of the Enterprise Committees will no longer take place in conjunction with the Spring Association of Clinical and Translational Science Meeting

- Informs the research community about NIH areas of scientific interest.
- Encourages investigator-initiated applications in those topic areas.
- May include new or emerging areas.
- Will expire after 1 year. NIH may extend.
- Help reduce NIH's use of funding opportunities by highlighting a topic instead (as appropriate).

Benefits for Research Community

- Reduce the effort to search and apply for funding opportunities.
- Apply through one of the <u>NIH Parent</u> <u>Announcements</u> or other broad NIH opportunities at Grants.gov.
- Search topics by keyword and filter by participating NIH Institutes, Centers, or Offices.
- Check back often for new topics and webpage features.

 5-day in person Bootcamp at Eli Lilly headquarters (lectures, panels, workshops/case-based studies) joining a cohort of new Lilly Clinical Research Physician and Scientists


Content includes:

- Understand the full drug development lifecyle from preclinical to post-market surveillance
- Understand key functions including interactions with clinical development, medical affairs, regulatory, safety, commercial, stats and manufacturing
- Fundamentals of regulatory101, safety101, statistics 101
- Phase 1 study design, Phase 2 trial design and execution, study set up and therapeutic considerations, Phase 3, trial design and execution e.g. endpoints and the label, clinical trial operations

Virtual component:

To follow bootcamp, twice a week for 2 months, followed by weekly for 2 months to supplement topics not covered in Bootcamp
